**Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection**  
Office on Violence Against Women

**Letter of Intent Deadline:** December 20, 2002

**GMS Registration Deadline:** January 10, 2003

**Application Deadline:** January 24, 2003 (9:30 PM Eastern)

**Summary:** The Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders are designed to encourage state, local, and tribal governments and state, local, and tribal courts to treat domestic violence as a serious violation of criminal law requiring the coordinated involvement of the entire criminal justice system. Grant funds may be used for implementing mandatory or pro-arrest programs and policies; developing policies and training in criminal justice agencies to improve tracking of domestic violence and dating violence cases; and creating centralized domestic violence units consisting of police, prosecution, or other criminal justice agencies. At least five percent of the funding for this program must be available for grants to Indian tribal governments.

**Eligibility:** States, Indian tribal governments, state and local courts including juvenile courts, tribal courts, and units of local government.

**NOTE: Jurisdictions that received more than 12 months funding in Fiscal Year 2002 are ineligible to apply for FY 2003 funding.**

**Funding:** All FY 2003 Arrest Program awards are subject to the availability of FY 2003 appropriations. The award period for these grants will be 24 months. Budgets must reflect 24 months of project activity. Individual units of local government, state or local courts or tribal governments should submit budgets ranging from \$150,000 - \$500,000. Budgets for state-wide, regional (involving 10 or more counties), or tribal consortia projects should not exceed \$750,000.

**Application Information:** Please note that final applications are due by 9:30 PM (Eastern) January 24, 2003, and will be accepted only through the OJP online Grant Management System (GMS). In addition, applicants should register online at least two weeks prior to the application deadline. It may take up to one week for you to receive confirmation that you are eligible to apply. Detailed instructions on how to use the GMS system to submit your application online are available at the Office's web site: [www.usdoj.gov/vawo](http://www.usdoj.gov/vawo). Also, a toll-free telephone number has been established for you to receive technical assistance as you work through the online application process at: 888-549-9901. ## **State Justice Institute - Grant Guideline**

**Summary:** This Guideline sets forth the administrative, programmatic, and financial requirements attendant to Fiscal Year 2003 State Justice Institute grants, cooperative agreements, and contracts. SJI offers five types of grants in FY 2003: Project Grants, Technical Assistance (TA) Grants, Judicial Branch Education Technical Assistance (JBE/TA) Grants, Continuation Grants, and Scholarships.

### **Project Grants**

**Application deadline:** February 7, 2003. The Board of Directors will meet in early May 2003 to approve grant awards. See section VI.A. for Project Grant application procedures.

**Summary:** Project Grants are awarded to support innovative education, research, demonstration, and technical assistance projects that can improve the administration of justice in state courts nationwide.

**Funding:** The Guideline allocates up to \$2 million for Project Grants in FY 2003, in addition to the \$800,000 in FY 2003 and 2004 funds allocated for the Solutions Project described below.

### **Technical Assistance Grants (TA Grants)**

**Application deadline:** Letters of application for a Technical Assistance Grant may be submitted at any time. The grant cycles for TA Grants are the same as the grant cycles for JBE/TA Grants:

**Application between:** January 11 and February 28, 2003

**Summary:** Under this program, a state or local court may receive a grant of up to \$30,000 to engage outside experts to provide technical assistance to diagnose, develop, and implement a response to a jurisdiction's problems.

**Funding:** A total of \$300,000 is reserved for Technical Assistance Grants.

### **Judicial Branch Education Technical Assistance Grants (JBETA Grants)**

**Application deadline:** Letters requesting JBE/TA Grants may be submitted at any time. The grant cycles for JBE/TA Grants are the same as the grant cycles for TA Grants:

**Notified:** March 28, 2003

**Application between:** January 11 and February 28, 2003

**Summary:** To enable a state or local court to adapt and deliver an education program that was previously developed and evaluated under an SJI project grant (i.e., curriculum adaptation); and/or (2) support expert consultation in planning, developing, and administering state judicial branch education programs.

**Funding:** Up to \$300,000 will be allocated for grants under the expanded program, which is renamed the Judicial Branch Education Technical Assistance (JBE/TA) grant program.

### **Scholarships**

**Application deadline:** Application cycle is as follows:

January 3 – March 3, 2003 for programs beginning between April 1 and June 30, 2003

April 1 - June 2, 2003 for programs beginning between July 1 – September 30, 2003

July 7 – August 29, 2003 for programs beginning between October 1 - December 31, 2003

October 1 – December 1, 2003 for programs beginning between January 1 - March 31, 2004

**Summary:** Funds for scholarships to enable judges and court managers to attend out-of state education and training programs. Scholarships will be approved only for programs that either (1) address topics included in the Guideline's Special Interest categories (section II.A.); (2) enhance the skills of judges and court managers; or (3) are part of a graduate degree program for judges or court personnel.

**Funding:** The Guideline allocates up to \$200,000 of FY 2003 funds for scholarships.

### **Continuation Grants**

**Letter of Intent Deadline:** Letter of Intent due 120 days prior to end of current grant. The Institute will then notify the applicant of the deadline for its Continuation Grant application.

**Summary:** Continuation Grants (see sections III.F, V.B.2., and VI.B.) are intended to enhance the specific program or service begun during the initial project grant period.

**Funding:** The Guideline establishes a firm limit for Continuation Grants of 20% of the total amount projected to be available for Project Grants in FY 2003, i.e., \$400,000.

In addition, there will be a single deadline for submitting letters of inquiry.**

**Eligibility:** Letters of inquiry will be accepted from national, regional, and local organizations working to increase sustainable individual and community wealth through homeownership and/or personal finance education; produce and preserve quality affordable housing; and/or create healthy, vibrant neighborhoods in Washington, DC. The foundation will dedicate the majority of its grants to providing operating support designed to help nonprofit organizations function more efficiently and effectively.

### **Mitsubishi Foundation Offers Funding for Technology to Help Youth with Disabilities**

**Deadline:** July 1, annually (full proposal)

**Summary:** The Mitsubishi Electric America (MEA) Foundation is dedicated to helping young people with disabilities, through technology, to maximize their potential and fully participate in society. The foundation welcomes concept papers that meet its mission. Examples of fundable projects include training youth with and without disabilities in multimedia and digital storytelling technology; supporting internships for blind or visually impaired students in a

product evaluation laboratory; training volunteers to adapt toys for children with disabilities; expanding "Virtual Volunteering" to enable people with and without disabilities to volunteer online; and providing a web site that serves as an online clearinghouse and online meeting space for families of children with disabilities.

**Eligibility:** Nonprofit organizations or projects with 501(c)(3) status that address a significant need of young people with disabilities, have national scope and impact, demonstrate potential for replication at other sites, and represent an innovative approach involving technology are invited to submit preliminary concept papers for consideration.

**Funding:** Funding is available for both projects and general operating support. Multi-year funding up to a maximum of three years will be considered. In the past, grants have ranged from \$6,000 to \$75,000, with the average amount about \$25,000.

**Application Information:** The foundation accepts preliminary concept papers throughout the year. If the concept paper is approved, the organization will be invited to submit a full proposal. **Summary:** The Armed Forces Domestic Security Act (HR 5590) was signed into law by President George Bush on Monday December 2, 2002. The House (October 15, 2002) and the Senate (November 14, 2002) passed HR 5590, to amend title 10, United States Code, to provide for the enforcement and effectiveness of civilian orders or protection on military installations. According to the Miles Foundation in their November 30, 2002 newsletter "Across the Miles", The Armed Forces Domestic Security Act provides that civilian orders of protection shall have the same force and effect on a military installation as such order has within the jurisdiction of the court that issued the order. The Secretary of Defense shall promulgate regulations to implement this section and to preserve good order and discipline among service members and civilians present on military installations. The Full Faith and Credit provisions of the Violence Against Women Act are not contained in this act nor is a date for development and implementation of regulations noted as part of the enacting clause.
